1 Lodewick Visitors Center

Each year, over 50,000 people take student-guided tours of the Storrs campus departing from the Lodewick Visitors Center. Designed for high school students starting their college search, tours include a 30-minute information session followed by a 90-minute walking tour, offering a broad overview of UConn's academic programs, facilities, student life, and the admissions process.



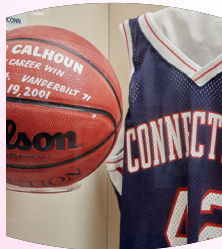
2 Science 1 Research Center

The State of Connecticut is deeply invested in UConn as an engine for innovation and economic development. With nearly 200,000 square feet dedicated to research, teaching, and core laboratories; a clean room; and a 240-seat active-learning room, Science 1 represents our significant commitment to STEM initiatives.



3 Jorgensen Center for the Performing Arts

Opened in 1955, the Jorgensen hosts 30 to 40 performances each season from nationally and internationally acclaimed artists and ensembles. Past acts include Duke Ellington, the Boston Pops, Royal Shakespeare Company, Kristin Chenoweth, and Colin Jost.



4 J. Robert Donnelly Husky Heritage Sports Museum

Huskymania is real — it's in our DNA! Experience Husky Spirit through the championship trophies and other memorabilia that weave the story of more than a century of UConn athletics at this museum in the Alumni Center.



5 Peter J. Werth Residence Tower

This residence hall houses 700 first-year and sophomore students in eight Learning Communities. Werth features the Innovation Zone, a two-story makerspace equipped with 3D printers, scanners, and other design tools; workstations; event space; a game room; community lounges; an Idea Lab; and more.



6 Student Union

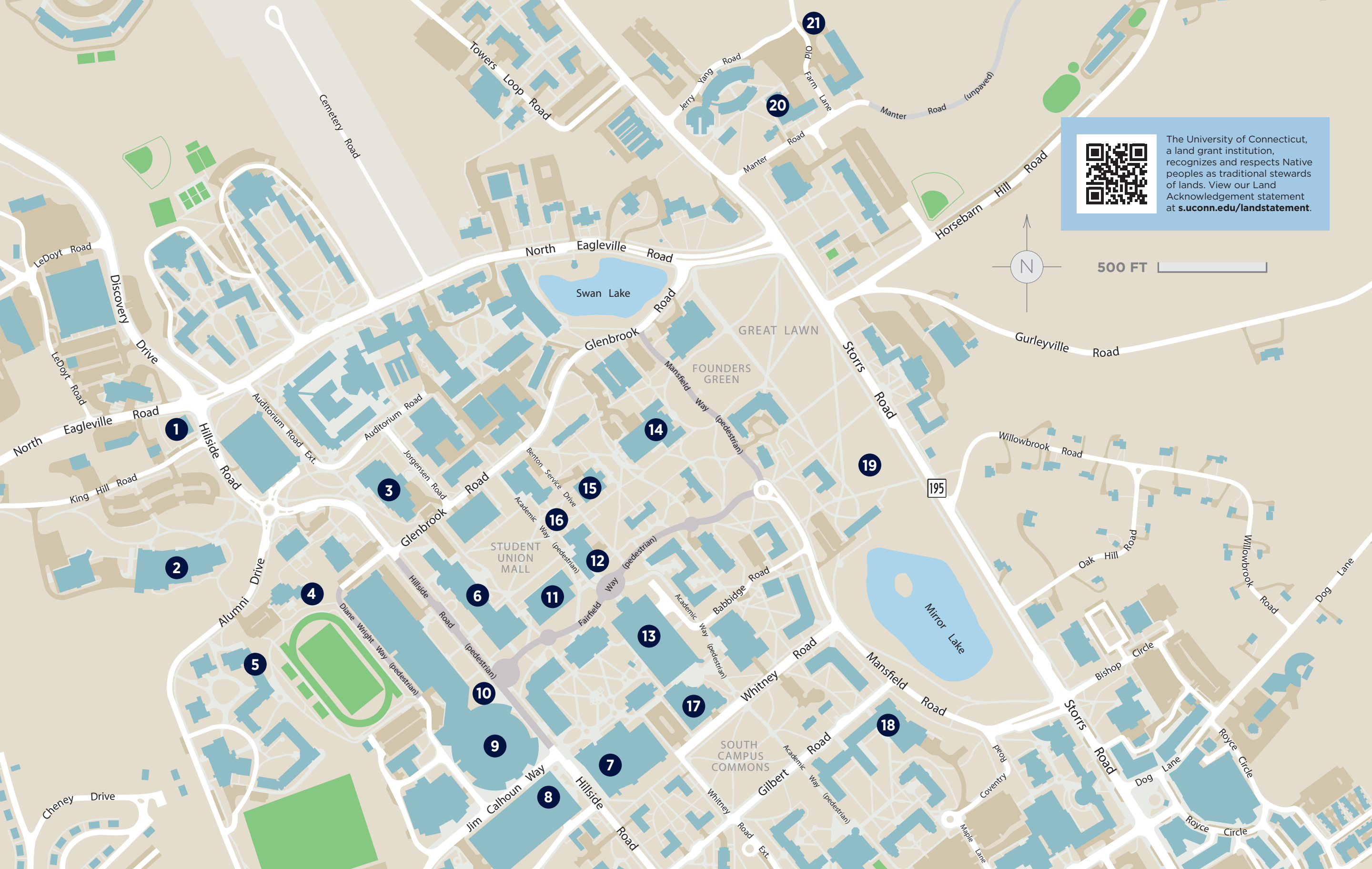
There's a reason students gather at the U: This place has it all. Huskies love to treat themselves at the food court, watch a movie or performance in the Student Union Theatre, hit the books in a study lounge, or play in the Doug Bernstein Game Room. UConn's Cultural Centers and several of our 700+ student organizations, including UCTV and WHUS, are based here, too.



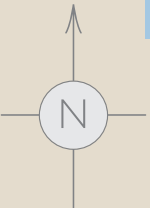
7 Student Recreation Center

UConn's dynamic, three-story Student Recreation Center includes everything students need to stay active. In addition to the familiar amenities, the Rec's 191,000 square feet include an eight-lane, 25-yard competitive swimming pool; a mind-body studio with an outdoor terrace; a four-court gymnasium and two additional multipurpose courts; a 56-foot-high climbing wall; a cycling studio; three racquetball courts; a three-lane track; and lots more.

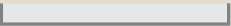

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8 UConn Bookstore

Find virtually any Husky gear imaginable, along with affordable textbooks, dorm essentials, and technology at the UConn Bookstore, operated by Barnes & Noble College.



9 Harry A. Gampel Pavilion

UConn is the Basketball Capital of the World, and this is where the magic happens. Sell-out crowds routinely fill the arena's 10,000+ seats to cheer on our men's and women's basketball teams. Our Huskies continue to rack up NCAA basketball championships and have set records with multiple perfect women's seasons and dual national titles in 2004 and 2014.



10 Husky Dog Statue

UConn's mascot, Jonathan the Husky, stands immortalized on the Storrs campus with this statue by local artist Larry S. Wasiele. Families gather here for graduation pictures, and fans and prospective students rub his nose for good luck. Go ahead and snap a photo with Jonathan — he loves the attention!



11 Lawrence D. McHugh Hall

This academic building offers state-of-the-art classroom space within its brick and copper façade while helping UConn reduce its carbon footprint. McHugh Hall, which boasts a 6,500-square-foot vegetated green roof, was the first on campus to achieve LEED Gold status.



12 John W. Rowe Center for Undergraduate Education

Some of our most popular academic programs are based here, including Experiential Global Learning (200+ programs around the globe); the Academic Center for Exploratory Students, or ACES (where students get help choosing among UConn's 125+ majors); and our prestigious Honors Program.



13 Homer D. Babbidge Library

In the academic core of campus, check out the millions of volumes housed in Homer Babbidge, the largest public research facility in Connecticut. The intellectual center of University life, UConn's integrated library system connects students to resources on campus and around the world.



14 Wilbur Cross Building

With its golden-domed cupola, this is the iconic University facility. All the services our students need — including One Stop Student Services and the offices of the Dean of Students, Bursar, and Registrar — are housed in this former library, one of 47 UConn buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Places.



15 William Benton Museum of Art

Immerse yourself in culture (for free!) at Connecticut's official state art museum, home to an impressive permanent collection that includes more than 6,500 works of art. The Benton features diverse rotating exhibits, special lectures and events, and unique collections and educational programs.



16 Albert E. Waugh Sundial Garden

This colorful, contemplative garden pays tribute to our first provost, who was an international sundial expert. Albert Waugh wrote "Sundials: Their Theory and Construction," and this monument features his designs.



17 The Dodd Center for Human Rights

Home to robust academic programs and innovative external engagement in human rights, the Dodd Center houses the Gladstein Family Human Rights Institute and its Dodd Human Rights Impact programs, the University Library's Archives and Special Collections, and the Center for Judaic Studies and Contemporary Jewish Life.



18 Connecticut Hall

Our newest 652-bed residential community offers suite-style rooms and includes a state-of-the-art dining facility, game room, and spacious living room. Each of the seven floors features student lounge areas for studying and socializing. Connecticut Hall is also UConn's first building to use a geothermal heating system, demonstrating our commitment to sustainability.



19 Great Lawn and Mirror Lake

Among the many benefits of UConn's rural setting is a landscape that always offers a place to unwind and have a good time, whether that means relaxing under a shady tree, jogging around the lake, or playing a pick-up game of ultimate.



20 UConn Dairy Bar

Our Dairy Bar, located on Horsebarn Hill, is famous for its 25+ homemade ice cream flavors and seasonal specials. The "sweetest course on campus" offers extra sprinkles (if not extra credit).



21 Horsebarn Hill

UConn started as a farm on a hill, so it makes sense to end the tour where it all began. The picturesque rolling peaks here are the centerpiece of UConn's founding department, the College of Agriculture, Health and Natural Resources. Take a photo in front of the red Jacobson Barn, envy the carefree lives of our cows, and cap your visit with some Dairy Bar ice cream — made with milk produced right here.
